


These letters share a visual similarity in their isolated forms, distinguished by the placement and number of dots above or below them. Understanding and mastering these letters is essential for anyone learning Arabic, as they frequently appear in both simple and complex linguistic constructs.

Letter **baa'** is a simple and uncomplicated letter in the Arabic language, and it is an explosive oral sound. The shape of the letter is one of the dotted letters, it resembles a plate with a dot under it. Letter **baa'** is pronounced like "**b**" in English. It is a **consonant** letter that gives the vowels a frontal quality. We pronounce it by closing the two lips together, using the wet part of the lower lip. It connects from both ends when it is in the middle position.



- Letter → has four shapes:
 → (initial), → (medial), → (final) and → (isolated).

Letter taa' is pronounced using the tip of the tongue with the roots of the top two incisors with aspiration. taa' connects from both ends when it is in the middle position. The shape of the letter is one of the dotted letters, it resembles a smiley face. Letter taa' is pronounced like "t" in English & is a consonant.



- Arabic is a cursive language; letters are connected from right to left and so they are read. Observe the different shapes of taa' in the above table.
- Letter ☐ has four shapes: ☐ (initial), ☐ (medial), ☐ (final) and ☐ (isolated).

Letter **thaa'** is pronounced like the sound of "th" in the word <u>th</u>ree, <u>th</u>umb, and tru<u>th</u>. We pronounce it with the tip of the tongue touching the ends of the upper two incisors. **thaa'** connects from both ends when it is in the middle position and is a **consonant**.



- Letter نه has four shapes: - (initial), نه (medial), نه (final) and نه (isolated).

Letter **nuun** is pronounced using the tip of the tongue and what lies opposite to it from the gum, like the English word "noon". This letter connects from both ends when it is in the middle position. **nuun** is pronounced like "n" in English and connects from both ends when it is in the middle position. It is a **consonant**.















Letter yaa' is the twenty-eighth and final letter of the Arabic alphabet. It holds a significant place in Arabic script due to its versatile roles and unique features. It is pronounced like the English "y" as in "yes" or sometimes like a long "ii" as in "see", depending on its placement and context within a word.
